Tiffany came to us for help caring for her two young boys after escaping a domestic violence situation. She had lost her housing and her job while filing domestic violence charges. While she had a protection order for herself, she did not have it for her boys and was nervous about being found. With no space in the shelter system, Tiffany turned to us for support. The boys stayed in our emergency shelter, and she was able to find a new job and enroll her children in daycare. Tiffany was able to maintain her sons' services with Help Me Grow, participate in her own counseling services, and address her legal needs. After 60 days they moved to a family shelter while waiting for permanent housing. She is now in her own apartment with her children and

active in our Aftercare program.
